The Keys to the Valley team wishes you a Happy Holidays and Happy New Year!

This Winter we look forward to finalizing our analysis and preparing a toolbox of strategies to improve housing options. We continue to consult both residents and advisors in this process. Most recently, we held virtual focus groups with residents to discuss solutions for some of our biggest challenges in funding, construction, regulations and more. A few conversation highlights :

- Municipal financial incentives are best approached as investments, not a tax break.
 These incentives are best managed over time to ensure fiscal feasibility.
- There is demand in the region for small, affordable and energy efficient homes, but these homes are in short supply. These homes are attractive as both rentals and owneroccupied homes, but aesthetics and livability need to be considered in design.
- Personal stories provide important context for discussing solutions.
- Regulations are complicated and change is hard, but new strategies must be tried. For community buy-in, local discussion and flexibility on specifics are important tools.
- With attention being placed on villages and downtowns, solutions need to address those living in more rural areas. What can we do for older homes that are off the main path?
- Becoming and being a landlord is difficult. A local resource to help individuals navigate some or all of the required steps would help the landlord and advance affordability of rent and local ownership.

We look forward to sharing what we've learned by Winter's end. In the Spring, we are excited to focus our efforts on attending and advancing community conversations that further a diverse exchange of ideas and solutions for our homes and those who live here.
