

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Implementation Priorities

1. Maintain the effort:

- a) Keys to the Valley will continue to meet and Maintain the Keys to the Valley website
- b) Update with 2020 Census data
- c) Update regional housing needs assessments. Update regional plan housing chapters
- d) Keep housing stories front and center/messaging

2. Regulatory reform:

- a) Work with local governments to streamline the permitting process for housing
- b) Work with communities to promote zoning modernization

3. Legislative reform:

- a) Work with legislators and partner organizations to encourage housing-related statutory changes
- b) Work with employers and other community leaders to reinforce the need for legislation

4. New tools to advance needed homes:

- a) Utility to promote small home and/or ADU development, both new construction and renovation
- 5. Coalition/capacity building, Create a housing movement:
 - a) Support the evolution of and contribute to priorities set for a regional housing fund
 - b) Encourage creation of local/multi-jurisdictional housing committees or ad hoc housing groups
 - c) Develop networking (e.g., annual convening) for housing committees, ad hoc housing groups, and local/regional organizations to share available resources and allow for needed supports
 - d) Cross pollinate advocacy/education/messaging Leading to action

Progress Updates

<u>ALL</u>: Planning a **convening for housing committees, organizations and advocates**. This event is being planned in coordination with the annual Vital Communities Housing Breakfast. Working with Dartmouth College students to evaluate business models for a **local housing utility**. Assisting many towns with **regulatory reform.**

<u>Mount Ascutney Regional Commission</u>: Working with Windham Regional Commission (WRC) & Windham Windsor Housing Trust on a series of **housing webinars**. Working with the Mount Ascutney hospital housing workgroup with a focus on home share. Working on a **regional plan update**.

<u>Two Rivers-Ottauquechee Regional Commission</u>: Working with housing groups both new and pre-existing. Continuing to roll out Keys **messaging** and technical recommendations. Census updates to be in the next iteration of regional plan, 2023.

<u>Upper Valley Lake Sunapee Regional Planning Commission</u>: Working with Vital Communities to update the **New Homes data count**. Working on a **Regional Housing Needs Assessment** to be done by end of 2022, including data updates, and deep dives on smart growth, community land trust, and planning for change.
